



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
WHAT'S ON

WINTER IN JULY OR WAS THAT JUNE

It used to be called Xmas in July, and this year it was more like "Antarctica Revisited" as the temperatures were extremely low for the whole of the weekend. Calling the BOM for some actual data proved elusive – they don't have a fully automated station at Beechworth so they supplied data from Rutherglen, nearby.

- Friday min of -0.4 and max of 15.7
- Saturday min of 0.4 max of balmy 8.0
- Sunday min of 2.6 and max of 7.9

The plan was to leave the Hall lay-by at 10am Friday so we wouldn't have to face fog all the way to Yass or more and that was accomplished also giving us the Saturday to look around glorious Beechworth and get some good sunny photography on Saturday morning. I had charged up my TomTom GPS the previous day and mounted it on the bike overnight. Gloom – the freezing temperatures affected the battery on the unit and I was GPS-less for the southbound portion of the trip. However, we headed off with four motor-cycles and 3 cars in good spirits and overcast, but dry, conditions. The group split up en-route with several people taking different directions to either stay overnight elsewhere or meander through the countryside rather than blast down the Hume (which some say is boring, but I find as mentally stimulating as you make it). More were to join us on Saturday directly from Canberra.

There appears to be a bit of confusion between NSW and Vic RTA's because coming through Wodonga they either have no signs pointing to



the C315 or hide them somehow. This meant that several cars and motorbikes went further down the Hume to the Chiltern turnoff and used the C377. Although this is a delightful piece of motorbike friendly road, the last couple of kilometres are a pain if you end up following a road maintenance vehicle in the really twisty bits at the end. First and second gear work, steep climb and 3 new swear words. The RTA driver at least got her vehicle down and dirty into the gravel to let me past. Thank you.


Beechworth at last and the warm friendly motel awaiting – and soon other folk from the ACT arrived and a reviving beer at the Bridge Brewers was called for. Like most of everything in north-eastern Victoria it has some tie or other to Ned Kelly; or claims to. By the time you finish your visit to Beechworth you will have seen the Ned Kelly toilet, the Ned Kelly washing line, the Ned Kelly photography shop etc. You get the idea. An evening meal in a warm pub and we all walked back to the motel with nobody having their hands run over by a passing motorist. We had two thunderstorms pass over us that evening and that was a harbinger of things to come. Two cold fronts were approaching from the west – targeting...US.

You remember (above) that the plan was to take some nicey-feeley photography on the Saturday morning. You know – the low sun angles, the saturated colour-temperature stuff, locals gambolling on the village green. Forget it. With the above mentioned temperatures and fog even the locals take an hour to put on

enough clothing after their morning ablutions before venturing outside in their "Ned Kelly approved" parkas. Oh – wait a minute, you already got the idea, so forget I mentioned it. Every street was heavily littered with leaves from an apparently late autumn and you eventually find a town that has no Woolworths, no Coles and no McDonalds as you perambulate the streets, truly a unique find. Although not geographically divided, the town can be viewed as such with retail, church and history being the dominant portions with post-Georgian architecture and small shops. Several of our lady members agreed it was retail therapy heaven in the commercial area. A slow walk down Church St shows how wealthy this area became from gold as the major denominations spent lavishly on their plots of land.




I sauntered between the locals and the visiting motorcyclists towards the historic area in Ford St and was intrigued by the It was something Telegraph Station. personal really. In 1921 or 22 my Father was finally released from the Victorian Repat Hospital (yes, he was at Anzac cove and Beersheba), joined the Post Master Generals Department, and was posted to Mansfield as a telegraphist/postal clerk. I assume the telegraph offices in both locations were similar and so I was interested in the equipment on show at the museum and the displays showing the history of telegraphy in Victoria in its earliest attempts at cross-state

communications. The lady attendant informed me, "There are several retired telegraphists here in Beechworth and they hold monthly meetings here and chat back and forth non-verbally". I was interested and told her that I could still send Morse at about 20-25 words per minute, but couldn't receive worth a dam through lack of practice – maybe one evening in Beechworth will correct that someday. It will have to be in summer!

The intent of the weekend, of course, was the Xmas in July function at the Priory. With a small correction to the date, we actually had it on the last day in June. Both Steve Hay and our President were the organisers and it went pretty well. As these functions go there was a large amount of laughter and some pleasant inter-club rivalry between the self-proclaimed "Mexicans" from south of the border and the Canberra contingent. The Vic contingent beat us over-all in the quizzes despite some challenges to the judging (a few won by ACT) and the greater number of Victorians present. The Priory is interesting historically, I'm sure, but wearing motorcycle boots and walking on their beautiful wood floors almost seemed the wrong thing to do. You could imagine a member of a Russian Royal House in riding boots on

such a floor and the story being written by Dostoyevsky with the sound effects to go It was clearly the with it. attempt by all religions to get a building at the highest spot in any town that was of significance at the time. Of course there are also some well done leadlight windows at the front of the building. Looking back it may be one of the largest multi-story buildings (except churches) in town.

Catering was rapid, warm and tasty – an aim some restaurants forget. The quantities were enough to make some patrons adjust their belts a little. High praise, but well earned and no mention of Ned what's-his-name all evening. They probably used a Ned approved dishwasher later.

I had an appointment just after midday in Wamboin on Sunday so I planned on leaving early – even as late as 7.30am but that didn't happen. Damn the port wine our table won on one of the prize giving's. I finally left about 8.15 and worked my way through quite heavy fog and wet roads with possible black ice at the altitude of Beechworth until I descended onto the plains level with Albury/Wodonga. There were a few valleys still draped in fog and I saw one valley (while standing still at an intersection) that had katabatic fog descending down the side of a valley – interesting temperature profile. (See, I told you we don't just go to motorcycle meetings so we can fill our bellies or make holes in the air as we blast along, didn't I?).

Returning through Wodonga on the "correct route" I encountered about 100 round-a-bouts. Well, that's a lie. It was probably 15 but was clearly round-a-bout training grounds for RTA folk. And so onto the Hume and the prospect of warm showers. Refuel at Holbrook and that makes one tank full enough to get home. Remember I said that I had contacted the folk at BOM? Well, I gave them a hypothetical question as well. I wanted to know what the wind chill value was for my return trip. So what did I get? The numbers I gave the BOM for their X-Y graph was simply 110Kph and ambient temperature of between 5 and 8degs C. Whoops – the BOM graph Y-axis only goes to 80Kph. Well, anyway using that value (80Kph and 8 degs c) what's the hypothetical temperature? MINUS 13 DEGs C!

My fingertips eventually returned to my body that afternoon despite heated handlebars and heated seat both on Max during the trip. My GPS said there were several metrics it accumulated for the return trip. These were an average speed of 112Kph, max of xxxKph (you guess), distance of 466 from Beechworth and travelling time of 4 hours 12 minutes between warm showers. All approved by Ned of course, I assume.

STARS SHINE AT GOODWOOD FESTIVAL OF SPEED

England's Goodwood of Speed Festival was held over June 28 to July 1, and it showcased plenty of twowheeled and two-legged motorcycle greats.

While predominantly a car event, England's Goodwood Festival of Speed an annual celebration of automotive exotica from both the production and racing worlds also shines a light on motorcycling, and this year's event, held over June 28 to July 1, was no different.

Australia's own Troy Corser made the pilgrimage to the Goodwood Estate in Chichester, West Sussex, to take part in the festival, where he took to the 1.16-mile hill climb course on the very same BMW R90S superbike that carried American racer Steve McLaughlin to victory in the very first AMA Superbike race, held at Daytona in 1976.

McLaughlin defeated teammate Reg Pridmore in a photo finish to claim the win,

and the historic model was recently put on display in the BMW Museum in Munich, Germany.

For Corser, the two-time World Superbike champion who campaigned BMW's S 1000 RR before his recent retirement, the R90S gave him a rare insight into a very different superbike era.

"The BMW R90S is a great bike to ride," he said. "I thought it would be a lot heavier but it's actually pretty light and it's got a lot of torque. It's fun to ride and I even did some wheelies on it. Overall, it was a great weekend the atmosphere was really nice and the weather was good, and not too hot.

This year the Committee has adopted a different approach where you book, pay and attend a selected rider training program and on completion present your 'certificate' to the Treasurer who will reimburse you \$100 off the course cost. Sorry no reimbursement for travel, accommodation, meals or entertainment: training course only.

You can only be reimbursed once in this program cycle, April 2012 to March 2013.

CLUB MEMBER FIRST AID TRAINING

Know all there is to know about cornering, braking and riding safely on road or dirt? Then maybe a first aid course is more to your liking or need; not having done a rider skills course.

The Club has arranged and will subsidise a motorcyclist centric first aid course. This one-day course will not turn you into a paramedic, but may give you the skills to help out at an accident until one turns up. Depending on where you are, this may be quite a wait and worth having some basic first aid skills like:

- Being Prepared
- Mechanism of Injury
- Scene Safety
- DRABCD action plan & CPR
- Choking

- Wounds & Bleeding
- Head, Neck and Spinal injury
- Chest & Abdominal injury
- Breaks & Dislocations
- Medical Emergencies

The dates of each course will be notified by email, so may sure that you are a financial member and look out for the email. More Rules: Only BMWMCCACT financial members will be accepted and preference given to those who have not completed a previous first aid course.

The cost of the subsidised course is \$40 per member who can live without the certificate and \$50 for those who want to be assessed and if successfully completed awarded a nationally recognised qualification in *'Provide Emergency Life Support'* (HLTFA201B).

'Remember the life you save doesn't have to be your own, so make sure you bring a riding buddy.'

NEW ZEALAND EXPOSURE...

Most of us have undertaken a tour of some sort on a motorbike whether it's a couple of days with your mates somewhere for the weekend, or a couple of weeks around the country. For motorcyclists more often than not it's the journey, which is more interesting than the destination. How many of you though, have shipped your bikes to a pre-determined destination, ridden for a few weeks and then shipped them back home again? One or two I'm sure, but an increasing number of motorcyclists are doing just that to experience motorcycling in New Zealand, or taking the easier option and renting a motorcycle on arrival in 'The Land of the Long White Cloud' to commence their touring experience.

For many New Zealand is the land of sheep and the mighty All Blacks rugby team, but for those in the know NZ also represents motorcycling nirvana. New Zealand is roughly the same size as the US state of Colorado or just under one-quarter the landmass of South Africa – big enough to see plenty of varying terrain and small enough not to have daunting distances. Both the North and South Islands are roughly of similar size and there are regular inter island car-ferry (similar in size to the English Channel car-ferries) sailings traversing the three-hour journey of Cook Strait. Foreign motorcyclists are always pleasantly surprised how readily kiwi motorcyclists return a wave, or to receive help from fellow motorcyclists if they involved in a breakdown on the side of the road.

If you have ever considered motorcycling in New Zealand, you will be in for a treat. The North Island has the volcanic activity, great beaches with many awe inspiring coastal roads, whilst the South Island has the majestic mountains, sweeping forests and relatively uncongested roads and wide open spaces. If one is pushed for time, two weeks motorcycling can adequately cover the major points of interest throughout New Zealand. Summer is the main touring season from November through to March, and indeed in the month of February both islands are jam-packed with touring motorcyclists. Highways in New Zealand are classified by a State Highway (SH) numbering system and virtually all are tar-sealed. Many of New Zealand rural tar-seal roads are undulating and windy, so it is relatively easy to approach a corner with too much speed.

South Island roads are of a better quality tar-seal than the North Island roads due to a ready supply of river shingle for seal chip. Whilst there are thousands of kilometres of gravel roads in the rural parts of New Zealand, nearly all arterial roads are tar-seal, though in the more remote areas motorcyclists do have to pay attention to the locality of fuel stations – petrol is currently (Aug 2012) about \$NZ2.10/litre. Also to factor in are many one-lane bridges throughout the country, and each bridge with their own give way protocol which can easily catch out an unsuspecting motorist. Earlier this year New Zealand changed its right hand turn give-way (yield) road rule of the past 35years, to that of the international community which brings the right hand turn rule in line with Australia.

Three recognized *must rides routes* within the New Zealand motorcycling community for the North Island both starting from Auckland are: the 1000km Northland three day loop and the four day 1200km Round East Cape Run. The third candidate is the Volcanic Plateau 200km day ride loop from Taupo passing the three central North Island volcanoes of Mount Tongariro, Ngauruhoe and Ruapehu. For the South Island the *must ride routes* are the world rating 120km State Highway 94 - The Milford Sound Road- which is hard to beat with majestic mountains and alpine scenery, along with SH6 which goes the length of the South Island and includes the remote Westland coastal forests and accessible glaciers. If your looking for New Zealand's motorcycling festival calendar showpiece then the four-day Burt Munro Challenge held in mid November will be for you (Munro was a Bonneville Salt Flats motorbike speed king from the 1960s). The Burt Munro Challenge is a four-day festival of all sorts of motorcycle racing located at the southern most city of Invercargill. One thing you can not escape in New Zealand is the drizzle and/or rain and even if your planning to ride in the height of summer expect to encounter wet weather at some point of your motorcycle vacation. It always surprises me than when kiwi motorcyclists regale their bike yarns from yester-year they always seem to remember the rides that involved inclement weather.

New Zealand is one of the few countries in the world where Suzuki is regularly the annual top selling motorcycle marque, and with Honda second, they both have dealerships in nearly all the provincial main centre's of the country, should any problems be encountered. BMW, Yamaha and Kawasaki have dealerships dotted around the country whereas Harley Davidson dealerships are not quite as prolific. Like any tour, failing to plan is planning to fail, however having said that New Zealand is an easy country to 'wing it' and to motorcycle tour on a day to day basis. So the next time your having your mates around for a few drinks and a barbeque, consider a kiwi motorcycle touring experience next summer.
