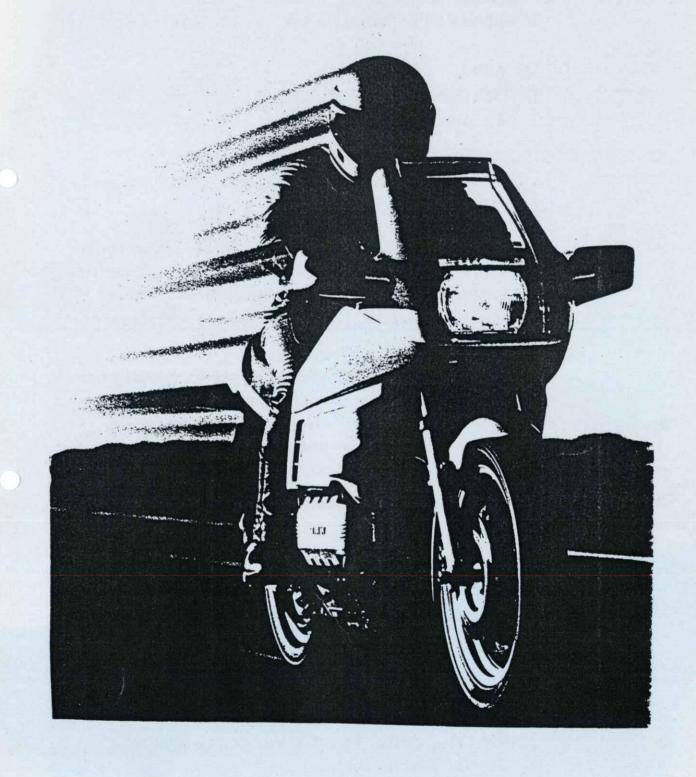

SECRETARY'S BIT

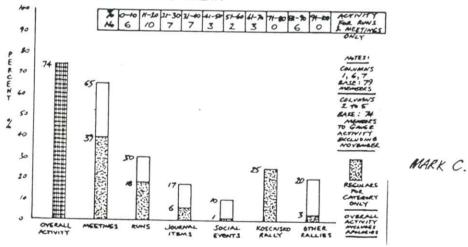

After a lateish start T.J., the BMW & I started off on our two week bike ride to the sunny north. Our aim was to attend the Bonneville Rally at Dubbo & then continue on through N.S.W. to QLD, travelling as far as possible before having to turn around to get back to Canberra to start work on

Other than being 'held up' by some bushrangers in the main street of Boorowa, who were collecting 'gold' to raise money for a fence around their new fauna park, the ride to Dubbo was fairly uneventful. (I won't say too much about the tent bag slipping all the time on the tank).

Once in Dubbo, being a Saturday afternoon, the main street was the 'place' for the newly weds of the town in their bridals cars to be seen. One original couple had 'prime-movers' as their transport. (very different)

After a feed 6 quick drink we headed out to the rally site via the last pub in town to stock up on some 'Green G'. The site was beside the Macquarie River, most of the bikers had camped on the dry part of the river bed, but we decided on a more quiet position back from the bank a couple of hundred feet. The band started before long, so we settled down beside our fire as the evening darkened.

About 8.30 the biker gathering increased with the arrival of approx. 20 - 30 Rebels.

We headed back into Dubbo to have a look at the well publisized Western Plains Zoo. (so did everyone else in the area) We'd planned to hire a tandem bicycle & travel the 7km around the zoo. 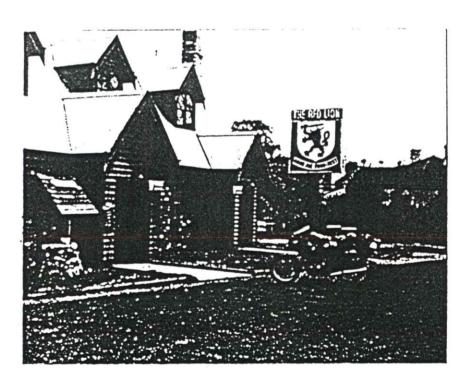

THE R90S-aga.

'B.M.W.', Jane once told me, stands for 'Best Motorcycle in World.' Being the satisfied owner of a splendid, (albeit slightly worn), K100, I'm the first to agree with her interpretation of that acronym: I honestly believe that it is the best thing on two wheels. It gets places, quickly; never complains; and always attracts admiring stares wherever it goes. But my first experience as the owner of a B.M.W. was far from untroubled. It was not the fault of the machine, mind you, but it had me wondering, quite often, what B.M.W. owners, and those who aspired to being B.M.W. owners, were always raving about.

I'd been without a motorcycle for several months by the time I decided it was time to get back on two wheels: my previous machine was a Suzi 750 Katana, a mean, unforgiving, inflexible but quite breathtaking missile that we sold in order to purchase something a little more sedate: a house. Really, it was a blessing in disguise; the Kat was a dreadful two-up tourer and we used to brawl constantly about who was going to be pilot, the loser having to sit out the miles in agony on the concrete-hard pillion seat. But it was still a motorcycle, and it wasn't long after we disposed of it that I was suffering extreme withdrawal symptoms.

A good friend of mine was the owner of a rather battered, but, he assured me, reliable B.M.W. R90S. When I mentioned that I felt I could no longer stand being 'sans cycle', his immediate reaction was, 'Get a B.M.' It had never occurred to me that something like a B.M.W. was within the means of a normal, everyday mortal like myself. Nor had it ever struck me that there was any such thing as a second-hand B.M.W. To my delight, I discovered (after a quick glance through the 'Motor Cycles' column in the Saturday paper) that I had been wrong on both accounts. But, I wanted one 'yesterday', and despite being constantly reminded of the dangers of rushing into things, I managed, almost, to purchase a dozen B.M.'s within ten minutes on the phone.

The first bike we looked at was a well-worn R90S. It had just been round Australia, (looked like it had been round the world!) and it's paint work was 'faded to late-Neanderthal'. The rear tyre was absolutely square in profile, which meant the machine was a little reluctant to go round corners; a mere deatil, I was told. The battery was on it's last legs and there was a nasty dent in the front rim. BUT!! the owner/seller pointed out proudly, it still had it's original seat, not a scratch or tear in it. Svengali had nothing on that bloke! I was back that afternoon with a \$2000 cheque in my hands and picked it up two days later after paying the \$700 outstanding.

Next morning when I went to start the thing, it simply wouldn't kick over. It wasn't until I put a new battery in it that I could thrill to the sound of a B.M. tick-a-ticking underneath me. It had an alarm that used to go off if the machine felt threatened, say by a sparrow landing in the vicintity or by news of trouble on the Afghan border and I was called out several times the first day to switch the bloody thing off. Teething troubles, I bravely assured myself.

Having a B.M., I was of course eager to get out on the highway with it, I mean, it is the tourer par excellance after all. We did our first trip on the machine out to Binalong, venturing on to Young for lunch, and it was there that I dedcided to see how fast the bike

could move. 160 k's. Not bad. Sadly, those long downhill runs were few and far between and the unreliability of the tailwind also hampered efforts to set a new land speed record. But the thing I noticed most was the effect of having a square tyre on the back... now I know why cars need four of them! My first priority was the rear tyre. A Dunlop roadrunner solved the bike's reluctance to corner, though there was still the problem of the weave. New rear shokkies would solve that! \$200 and a pair of Marzocchi's later and what did I have? A blown rear-drive seal!

I've never liked working on machines! I have this electromagnetic field around me that abhors angular objects, like the heads on bolts and mutilates them without provocation. But it was traditional, I was told, for B.M. owners to work on their bikes, so in I dived. Two seals later and the problem was rectified. Just in time for the rearmain to pack it in.

Don't get me wrong! There were times that I actually enjoyed having the thing. Two of them in fact! Like the coast trip in the pouring rain, and the trip out west to watch the start of the Australian National Gliding Championships... in the pouring rain. Come to think of it, the R90S was the first of my water-cooled B.M.W.'s. Anyway, on the way out to Narromine I managed to get it up to an unprecedented 180 k's/h, overtaking Jane on her Yammy 650 like she was standing still, and our travelling companion on his Kawasaki GT 750... like he was doing 170 k's/h. That all came to an end when one of the new H/T leads vibrated off the left plug, as it had a habit of doing. By the time we got back to Canberra my bike had developed tuberculosis of the carby and was coughing and hacking and spitting, due, I discovered after \$70 odd, to a stuck choke.

By Christmas time, I had the sneaking suspicion that my trusty mount was not all that it was cracked up to be... or that it had cracked up to be all that it was GOING to be! I'd been convinced by the previous owner of the machine that the rear-main could not possibly have gone since he had put a new one in only a little while ago (six months... or did he say years?) so I set to and resolutely dismantled the bike. Target: gearbox. Ignoring suggestions from several experts to the contrary, I insisted that it was the gearbox input-shaft seal that had croaked. The bike was reassembled with a new seal, and sure enough, it piddled oil straight away. But it was holiday time.. the rear-main would have to wait, along with the fork-seals which had recently come out in sympathy.

On the way to Sydney on Christmas eve, we discovered what the B.M. had planned for the holidays: gearbox malfunction. Swearing and ranting, I goaded the bike along the highway, it responding by dropping out of second or third, or second AND third, usually when we were in the process of overtaking semi's in the face of oncoming high-speed traffic. It was not a happy trio that finally reached Sydney.

It was time for action... and what better action than getting a new bike! Not just a new BIKE, but a new B.M., THE new B.M.! As soon as we got back to Canberra, Jane did a ring-around, pricing the newly arrived K100's, and the yet-to-arrive K100RS's. The RS wasn't due out for another few months, but I wanted one 'yesterday', and having never even seen one in the flesh, er, alloy, I ordered a K100 in Sydney.

So it was fitting that our last ride on the dissipated old R90S should be a long one: to Sydney to be traded on the K100. There was a

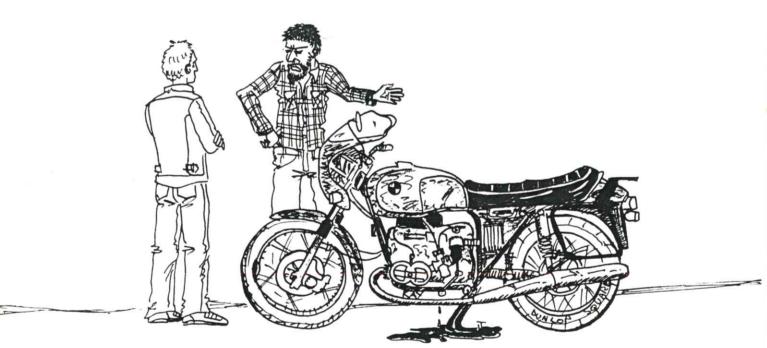
bit of tension when we delivered our old bike, the trade-in, to the B.M.shop in Sydney. It had ninety-odd thousand k's on the clock, had barely any paint on it, leaked oil and had a nasty dent in the front rim. BUT! I pointed out proudly, it still had it's original seat; not a scratch or tear in it!

It was more like a treaty than a sale.
