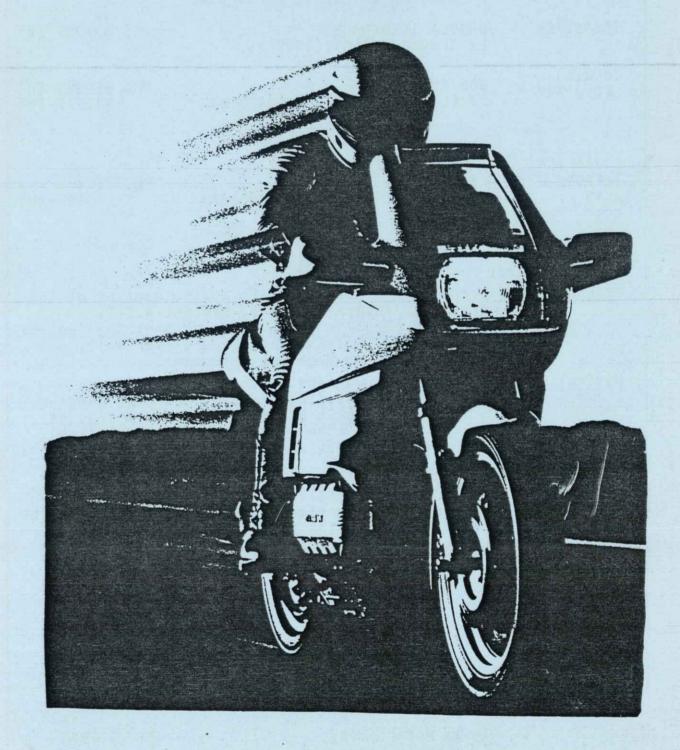

For example :- news of the win by Gaston RAHIER on his BMW in this years Paris-Dakar Rally (for His second, & BMW's fourth time in 7 years of the Rally). The win in this 11,000 km event is even more remarkable when you realise that he crashed on the first day and had to work his way up from 27th place to take the lead only 3 days from the end of the 3 week DESERT RACE. At one time more than 20 riders got lost in a vicious sand storm, including the leader of that stage on a Yamaha. And next year they want to make even tougher !!!!

Following on with that, BMW Australia may bring Gaston & possibly his team mate, Eddy Hau, out for the 'Wynn's' Melbourne - Darwin Safari, if there is some 'real' competition - (i.e. Yamaha or Honda factory backed bikes entered). Seems they don't want it to be 'TOO EASY'.

BMW cars also took out the first event of the touring car series for '85 with a win by John Richards at Winton (VIC) recently. A BMW was second

'Revs' magazine gives October as the likely date for the world release of the new K75 (3 cylinder) 750 cc BMW with the 'RS' version due later. BMW will no doubt let us know more details closer to the release date in Australia probably early '86.

Registration figures for 83/84 show a marked increase for BMW motorcycles. For the period Jan. to Nov. sales went from 562 ('83) to 1386 ('84)

no doubt due to the popularity of the K100 series.

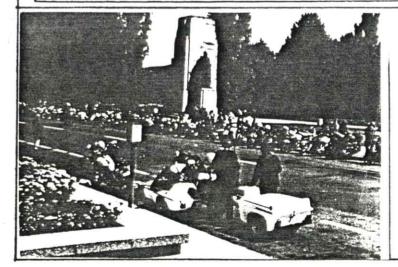

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Australia Day Long Weekend

Friday was still quite a warm day as I set off in the company of Tony Wurzer & his brother Mike to go to the Australia Day Rally near Tumut. But by the time we reached the Adaminaby turnoff outside Cooma I was cold enough to put on overtrousers and, for the first time since last winter, a balaclava. Consequently a hot coffee was most welcome at our fuel stop in Adaminaby.

Beyond, on the scratchers road through Kiandra, it was very cold & dark, with only a sliver of a moon, just above the horizon and the wildlife

were out in force.

The temperature rose remarkably at the bottom of Talbingo Mtn. and we arrived in Tumut around midnight and found a group of riders from Albury who didn't know how to get to Argalong either. As we chatted in the main street two policecars constantly circled the block and attempts were made to stop one to ask directions.

Waving at the driver had no effect, he just waved back, and

eventually someone stood out on the road and pulled him up.

While he obtained directions to Argalong the rest of us were keenly checking out his radar gear (it's nice to see where your money goes). A passing car registered 30 kph and Tony achieved 3 kph by running along in front of the car.

Out at Argalong, after 30 km of steep & winding dirt road, there was only one person in attendance at what was apparently the Rally site & he was of course, asleep. We followed a couple of cardboard signs a few hundred yards and found another 50 or so people camped near a small house. This was the unofficial, alternative rally site.

We pulled up and began chatting with some friends from Sydney. It seems that this old bush hermit type had invited everyone to camp at his shack, as the rally site was supposed to be snake infested. But after a few beers he decided that it was way past his bedtime & that we should all shut

up so he could go to sleep.

After a one sided argument lasting five minutes or so he added a few rifle shots to reinforce his point. Suddenly everyone was quiet, lights were doused and much murmering discussion ensued. We left immediately and camped at the official alternative rally.

By the time I got up in the morning the only representative of the organising club had left the scene (he didn't return until mid afternoon) and there was much confusion amongst everyone who turned up during the morning as to whether this was actually the rally site.

The site was just an area of bush alongside the road, three feet deep in grass and only a few acres in area, hard to tell apart from any other

piece of bush in the district.

Almost everyone who arrived that morning left again soon after, heading for the Clubman Rally, but we stayed for a while and Ian & Jeanette Hahn arrived from the unofficial rally site come shooting gallery. Werner & Ursula came from Angler's Reach around midday.

It was a very hot morning so lunch at a pub in Tumut seemed a good idea before heading south through Batlow to Tumbarumba where we sat in the

pub, watched cricket on T.V. and beat the locals at pool.

After we had cooled down we took off for Jingellic where the Clubman Rally is held. At the pub there were about 200 people, mostly outside, it's only a small pub. There was a cricket game in the middle of the road & plenty of burnout and wheelstand demonstrations on various japanese noisemakers. At one time there was such a crowd on the roof of the hotel verandah that the iron caved in and the beer was turned off until suitable repairs were effected.

Victoria's mug drivers are the 'world's worst'

A ROAD traffic authority yesterday said Victorian drivers were the worst in the world.

Mr Jack Martin should know. He recently retired as Victoria's Assistant Commissioner of Police (Traffic).

Mr Martin made the declaration .while . receiving Australia's first annual Road Traffic Authority Road Safety Award at the offices of the Ministry of Transport in Melbourne yesterday.
"People who have been

overseas and driven in the biggest cities, come to Vic-toria and are terrified," Mr Martin said.

He had a rather uncomplimentary code for many of vehicles on the State's of the State's drivers

THUGS - people who drove while impaired.

THUGGERY - intimidating other drivers at red lights.

MUGS — people who cut off other drivers without indicators or tail lights.

Mr Martin said Victoria's drivers were "rotten", the worst in Australia – he later expanded that to the world.

But Mr Martin has helped his State's "rotten" drivers at least to stop killing one another. He was honoured for his major contributions in reducing Victoria's road toll from 1061 in 1970 to 645 last year.

In that time, the number

roads nearly doubled to about 2.4 million.

During the presentation, Victoria's Premier, Mr Victoria's Premier, Mr Cain, said Mr Martin's dedication meant there were many Victorians alive in 1985 who might otherwise have been killed in road accidents.

During Mr Martin's years with the Police Force - he joined in 1946 and was appointed Assistant Commissioner in 1981 - he had been involved in the introduction of compulsory blood alcohol tests for road accident victims, compulsory wearing of seat belts, overall speed limits, random breath testing blitzes and increased drink-driving penalties.

DAWDLERS AND HAT-WEARERS BEWARE

please note - it is now a bookable offence to run in the right hand lane on a freeway - unless you're overtaking a slower car.

Too many Aussie drivers blissfully ignore the signs that say, Keep Left Unless Overtaking.

But to ignore them any longer invites a \$50 fine and the loss of two points.

A recent change to the law virtually makes the lane closest to the centre line on a multi-lane road, an over-taking route only. The new rule came into force during late October and the period of amnesty is now over.

While most motorists normally wouldn't be too pleased with the addition of yet another bookable offence, this one makes a lot of sense. Lane discipline in Australia is among the worst in the world.

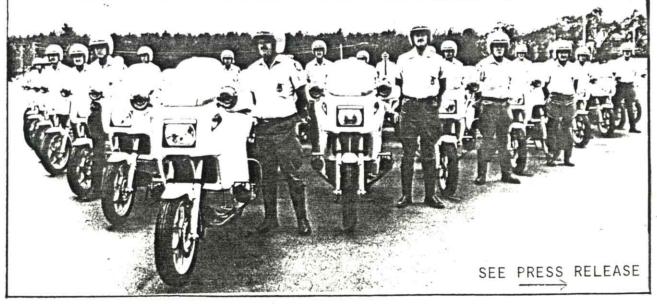
In many European countries, fast lane dawdling is a serious breach - not only of the law, but of driver etiquette.

WORLDWIDE FIRST WITH BMW MOTORCYCLES IN CANBERRA

The Australian Federal Police (A.F.P.) based in Canberra have become the first police force in the world to take delivery of the latest BMW K100 TIC motorcycles adapted specifically for law enforcement duty.

The delivery of 45 BMW K100 TIC motorcycles was accepted by the Officer in Charge of the A.F.P. Traffic Division Chief Inspector Peter Curtis and forms part of a total order for 92 machines.

The high reputation established by BMW Motorcycles in use by police forces worldwide led to the new machines being placed under assessment by several Australian State Police Forces. The A.F.P. were the first force to evaluate the K100 TIC and commenced trials in July 1984. Low overall operating costs combined with a high resale value provided very significant factors in the decision to confirm the order.

The innvoative police versions share the following hi-tech features with the standard K100 Series which was released to the Australian market in October 1983:

- Four cylinder, light alloy, water cooled engine of 998 cc
- Twin overhead camshaft design for smooth operation
- Electronic ignition for trouble free running
- Computer controlled fuel injection for maximum power and performance linked with minimum fuel consumption.

Maximum acceleration is stated by the Federal Police to be in the region of 0-100 km/h within a time of 3.9 seconds whilst the top speed is 220 km/h. This exceptional performance is a pre-requisite for the job of patrolling the capitals' road network and the apprehension of traffic and crime offenders.

Commenting on the handing-over of the vehicles to the Federal Police, Mr Steve Crouch, National Sales Manager - Motorcycles, of BMW Australia Ltd. said: "Meeting the rigours of Australian operations is just another example of BMW's approach to engineering excellence and technical innovation."

After spending Christmas at home with the family it was time to start travelling again. A quick trip back to Canberra and then to pack my bags for Tassie. I left just after midday on Sun. 30 Dec. with a strong chance of rain. The thought of going down the Hume didn't appeal, and since I was planning on taking two days to get to Melbourne, I decided to head for Cooma, over Brown Mountain and down the coast.

It started to rain shortly after I left and rained most of the way to the coast. Thick fog over the mountains made it very interesting as it became quite dark and it was raining quite hard. Fortunately there was no traffic around me and I had a slow but safe ride through the twisty corners. I hope it's not going to be like this in Tassie, I thought to myself.

After reaching the coast the weather improved and I enjoyed the ride to Bairnsdale for an overnight stop. The caravan park I stayed at was expensive at \$8 for a tent site, but the amenities block was very good.

In the early afternoon of New Year's Eve I rode into Melbourne for the very first time. In all of my previous trips I have avoided Melbourne, for fear of suspension damage but I had no trouble finding the ANL terminal.

I met up with several other riders, many of whom had tried to book a few months beforehand, and were told - no chance. One in particular, Nigel, on a CB550, had been at the terminal all day, and had placed his name on a list. Some of the others hadn't even heard that there was a list. Nigel seemed very surprised when I told him I had booked 12 months ago.

When the office opened just after 5pm Nigel was in the queue but was told there were no deck chairs available; so he said "How about a cabin then" and they said "Oh yeah, you can have a cabin!"

Shortly after the office opened, a bloke announced that all drivers of vehicles do not need to be in the queue, and to line up in their vehicles outside. Perhaps a sign in the office area would be better.

The gate opened about half past six, ticket checked, and I was onboard. Securing the bike for sea was quite simple. For those of you who haven't 'ridden' to Tassie, the bike is backed into a bicycle style stand, where the rear wheel sits in a rectangular frame. I tied the ropes supplied to the crash bars.

Since this trip was on New Year's Eve, it was decided to keep the bar open till 12.30. Beer was \$1 per middy.

The ship berthed just after 10am and I was off for Hobart down the central main highway. Good weather and great roads started the trip on a high note. I did a lot of overtaking.

I stayed at a mate's place in Hobart and made several day trips. Freycinet National Park up the east coast contained a magnificent bush walk up to the Wineglass Bay Lookout. Apparently some of the Sydney-Hobart yachts call in there on their way back to the mainland, but I didn't see any there. Judging from what I saw at Constitution Dock the day before all the yachts were still in Hobart. I saw Mystic VII arrive, having been at sea for seven days. Their faces were filled with relief - for they had finished whereas many yachts had retired. The pollution in Constitution Dock from beer cans and wine bottles detracted from the spectacle somewhat.

Other day runs from Hobart included Hastings Caves to the south, Port Arthur to the south-east and Mt. Field National Park to see Russell Falls. Here also I went walking through the National Park and was lucky enough to see seven wallabies.

After Hobart I made a dash up the west coast. The sky was overcast but not too bad. It started to rain after about an hour and rained nearly all the way to the north coast.

The road meets the coast at Somerset and I turned right mainly in search of fine weather. I promised myself to go back down the west coast when the weather improved. I stayed in Devonport for a few days where I met up with my parents.

One fine morning the weather looking ripe for a trip down the west coast. I picked a great day, for there were no clouds on the western horizon and a mid twenties temperature had been forecast.

Travelling south, I turned right to go down to Savage River. What a road! It really is something else. I scraped my boots on both sides, but when my left boot was knocked from the footpeg I slowed down a bit. Continuing further south I rode through Strahan, Rosebery, Zeehan, Queenstown and a two night stop was made at New Norfolk.

The next day belongs to Strathgordon. I found the road to be more interesting than the Savage River road. There was far less hair-pin bends and the scenery was more spectacular. The huge granite cliffs in particular were outstanding. They were viewed from a curve in the road across a deep valley floor. They stood out boldly against the vegetated hills surrounding them. They appeared to be in clear contrast to everything else and reminded me of being at the pictures where the film stands out from the dark walls surrounding it.

Jeffrey's track, covered in a recent issue of BIKE Australia, was found just south of New Norfolk. It is a dirt road short cut between New Norfolk and Huonville further south. The track wound its way up through hilly country which contained many secluded and attractive looking farms. Unfortunately I came up to a locked gate and had to turn back. The track was narrow but quite good otherwise.

After New Norfolk I headed north again to stay in Launceston for two nights. The weather was still fine and warm with little chance of rain. From Launceston I made a day trip of the entire north-eastern section of the state. I went north to Georgetown, turned east to Bridport and south through Scottsdale, Derby, St. Helens, St. Marys, Bicheno north-west to Avoca Park and then north back to Launceston via Conara Junction. This trip included about 20-30km of dirt, but that was quite alright by me.

After Launceston it was west again on the north coast to Stanley. It is in Stanley where 'The Nut' is located. This is an Ayers Rock type formation which towers over the coastline and was very enjoyable to climb. Good views along the coast were observed in the continuing fine weather.

After climbing the Nut, a good feed and a beer or two were enjoyed at the pub. I also rode out further west to Marrawah and had a look at Rocky Cape National Park with its lighthouse and cave.

On my last day in Tassie, 17 Jan., I had a look at Leven Canyon to see a magnificent V-shaped river valley. A short walk through the forest ended at a lookout point where one could see the river meandering through beautiful forest country.

Both Gunns Plain and Hastings Caves were well worth looking at. Because I had been to Tassie the previous year, I concentrated on the roads. This was

ideal with the bike and the good weather.

The food on the Empress was good, but I was surprised at having to pay extra for it. A new ship, the Able Tasman, will be in operation about the middleof this year and bookings are being taken for it already, so all I can advise is to book as soon as possible. The great roads of Tasmania are there just waiting for you.
