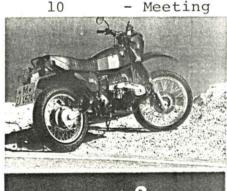

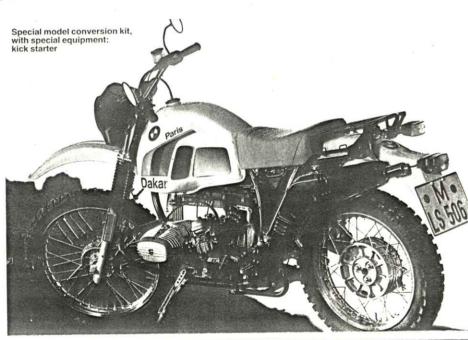

THE ROAD

Rarely has the love of man for speed, for the open road, for the engine that transports him, been more sharply expressed than in this description by T.E. Lawrence - Lawrence of Arabia - of a race between a motor-cycle and an aeroplane. The extract comes from "The Mint" which Lawrence published under the name of J.H.Ross while he was trying to hide himself in the R.A.F. with the rank of aircraftsman. Later he became T.E.Shaw. He was killed riding his motor-cycle on May the 19th, 1935; he was still in the service.

The extravagance in which my surplus emotion expressed itself lay on the road. So long as roads were tarred blue and straight; not hedged; and empty and dry, so long as I was rich. Nightly I'd run up from the hangar, upon the last stroke of work, spurring my tired feet to be nimble. The very movement refreshed them, after the day-long restraint of service. In five minutes my bed would be down, ready for the night: in four more I was in breeches and puttees, pulling on my gauntlets as I walked over to my bike, which lived in a garage-hut, opposite. Its tyres never wanted air, its engine had a habit of starting at second kick: a good habit, for only by frantic plunges upon the starting pedal could my puny weight force the engine over the seven atmospheres of its compression.

Boanerges' first glad roar at being alive again nightly jarred the huts of Cadet College into life. "There he goes, the noisy _____," someone would say enviously in every flight. It is part of an airman's profession to be knowing with engines: and a thoroughbred engine is our undying satisfaction. The can wore the virtue of my Brough like a flower in its can. Tonight Tug and Dusty came to the step of our hut to see me off. "Running down to smoke, perhaps?" jeered Dusty hitting at my regular game of London and back for tea on fine Wednesday afternoons.

Boa is a top gear machine, as sweet in that as most single-cylinders in middle. I chug lordily past the guard room and through the speed limit at no more than sixteen. Round the bend, past the farm, and the way straightens. Now for it. The engine's final development is fifty-two horse power. A miracle that all this docile strength waits behind one tiny lever for the pleasure of my hand.

Another bend and I have the pleasure of one of England's straightest and fastest roads. The burble of my exhaust unwound like a long cord behind me. Soon my speed snapped it, and I heard only the cry of the wind which my battering head split and fended aside. The cry rose with my speed to a shreik: while the air's coldness streamed like two jets of ice cold water into my dissolving eyes. I screwed them to slits, and focussed my sight 200 yards ahead of me on the empty mosaic of the tar's gravelled undulations.

Like arrows the tiny flies pricked my cheeks: and sometimes a heavier body, some house-fly or beetle, would crash into face or lips like a spent bullet. A glance at the speedometer: seventy-eight.

"Boanerges is warming up!"

I pull the throttle right open, on the top of the slope, and we swoop flying across the dip, and up-down, up-down the switchback beyond: the weighty machine launching itself like a projectile with a whirr of wheels into the air at the take-off of each rise, to land lurchingly with such a snatch of the driving chain, as it jerks my spine like a rictus.

Once we so fled across the evening light, with the yellow sun on my left, when a huge shadow roared just overhead. A Bristol Fighter, from Whitewash Villas, our neighbour aerodrome, was banking sharply round. I checked speed an instant to wave; and the slip-stream of my impetus snapped my arm and elbow astern, like a raised flail. The pilot pointed down the road towards Lincoln. I sat hard in the saddle folded back my ears and went away after him, like a dog after a hare. Quickly we drew abreast, as the impulse of his dive to my level exhausted itself.

The next mile of road was rough. I braced my feet into the rests, thrust

my arms and clenched my knees on the tank till the rubber grips goggled under my thighs. Over the first pot-hole Boanerges screamed in surprise, its mudguard bottoming with a yawp upon the tyre. Through the plunges of the next ten seconds I clung on, wedging my gloved hand in the throttle lever so that no bump should close it and spoil our speed. Then the bicycle wrenched sideways into three long ruts: it swayed dizzily, wagging its tail for thirty awful long yards. Out came the clutch, the engine raced freely: Boa checked and straightened his head with a shake, as a Brough should.

The bad ground was passed and on the new road our flight became birdlike. My head was blown out with air so that my ears had flailed and we seemed to whirl soundlessly between the sun-gilt stubble fields. I dared, on a rise, to slow imperceptibly and glance sideways into the sky. There the Bif was, 200 yards and more back. Play with the fellow? Why not? I slowed to ninety: signalled with my hand for him to overtake. Slowed ten more; sat up. Over he rattled. His passenger, a helmeted and goggled grin, hung out of the cockpit to pass me the "up yer" R.A.F. randy greeting.

They were hoping I was a flash in the pan, giving them best. Open went my throttle again. Boa crept level, 50 feet below: held them: sailed ahead into the clean and lonely country. An approaching car pulled nearly into its ditch at the sight of our race. The Bif was zooming among the trees and telegraph poles, with my scurrying spot only 80 yards ahead. I gained though, gained steadily: was perhaps five miles an hour the faster. Down nt my left hand to give the engine two extra dollops of oil, for fear that something was running hot, but an overhead JAP twin, supertuned like this one, would carry on to the moon and back, unfaltering.

We drew near the settlement. A long mile before the first houses I closed down and coasted to the crossroads by the hospital. Bif caught up, banked, climbed and turned for home, waving to me as long as he was in sight. Fourteen miles from camp, we are, here: and fifteen minutes since I left Tug and Dusty at the hut door.

I let in the clutch again, and eased Boanerges down the hill, along the tram-lines through the dirty streets and up-hill to the aloof Cathedral, where it stood in frigid perfection above the towering close. No message of mercy in Lincoln. Our God is a jealous God: and man's very best offering will fall disdainfully short of worthiness, in the sight of Saint Hugh and his angels.

Remigius, earthy old Remigius, looks with more charity on me and Boanerges. I stabled the steel magnificence of strength and speed at his West door and went in, to find the organist practising something slow and rhythmical, like a multiplication table in notes, on the organ. The fretted, latisfying and unsatisfied lace-work of choir screen and spandrels drank in the main sound. Its surplus spilled thoughtfully into my ears.

By then my belly had forgotten its lunch, my eyes smarted and steamed. Out again, to sluice my head under the White-Hart's yard pump. A cup of real chocolate and a muffin at the tea shop: and Boa and I took the Newark road for the last hour of daylight.

He ambles at forty-five and when roaring his utmost, surpasses the hundred. A skittish motorbike with a touch of blood in it is better than all the riding animals on earth, because of its logical extension of our faculties, and the hind, the provocation to excess conferred by its honeyed untiring smoothness. Because Boa loves me, he gives me five more miles of speed than a stranger would get from him.

At Nottingham I added sausages from my wholesaler to the bacon which I'd bought at Lincoln: bacon so nicely sliced that each rasher meant a penny.

The solid panniers behind the saddle took all this and at my next stop (a farm) took also a hammocked box of fifteen eggs. Home by Sleaford, our squalid, purse proud, local village. Its butcher had six penn'orth of dripping ready for me. For months I have been making my evening round a-marketing, twice a week, riding a hundred miles for the joy of it and picking up the best food cheapest, over half the countryside."

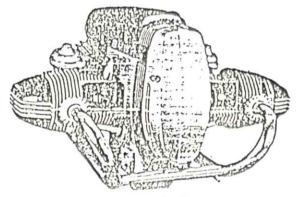

WASHING YOUR SLEEPING BAG

Now the cooler weather is getting nearer, it's time to drag your feather or down sleeping bag out of mothballs and give it a good clean before using it on your next chilly camping trip. And also, for those funny people who use their sleeping bags all year round, it's time to get the summer dirt and sweat out of them.

My grandmother (who, incidentally,

has never ridden a bike, except

feather and down eiderdowns for

ones sidesaddle) has been washing

hundreds of years. So, with her expert advice, Bob and I decided to wash one of our sleeping bags. Firstly, you half fill your bath with warm water, dissolve "Lux" flakes or "Softly" in the water and submerge the bag. Ideally, you should leave the bag to soak for a few days, but we were in a hurry to use the bath that day, so we decided to dive in feet first and march up and down the bath as if squashing grapes for wine. After thorough ly cleaning the bag, drain the water and keep filling the bath with rinsing water until the water runs clear, squish all the excess water out with hands or clean feet (if you used the feet before, they are sure to be clean now). Throw the bag over the clothes line on a dry day. To fluff up the feathers pockets), put in a tumble dryer and dry on a warm setting. You'll be surprised at how clean your sleeping bag has become and so

fluffed up.

N.B. Apart from the cost, it's not a very good idea to dry clean a sleeping bag unless it's been thoroughly aired, as the fumes given off the bag can be dangerous. (The Scout Association often emphasises this point.)
