

Borrowed from Classic Clatter, (Classic Enthusiasts M.C.C., NSW) magazine, Jan 1987.

Europe, during the 14th century, suffered from bubonic plague. This plague is believed to have come from Asia Minor and was introduced into Europe by bands of roving bandits and invaders such as the Huns.

There is no evidence that bubonic plague ever reached Australia. But are we, some 600 years later, suffering from *TEUTONIC PLAGUE*? I mean, has anyone else noticed the insidious fifth column of BMWs that has begun to infiltrate the Club?

Now, I should make it very clear here that I am not talking about those old BMW's or those ridden by blokes whose interest in Classic Bikes lays mainly with historic racing or indeed where the only road bike is a BMW. No—I'm talking about those outwardly sane club members who have at least one and often usually more fully operational Classics in the garage (BMW owners don't have sheds), but who insist and persist on riding the Munich motorcycle (or Berlin bike depending on the year) on Classic Club runs. Now both by observing the phenomena and by surreptitious and probing questions I've noticed that the Bee Emmers themselves seem unsure of their motives. Perhaps it's the ageing effect as Teutonic Plague appears to affect mostly males from the late forties onwards. 
