TOURING USA - PART 1: ACCOMMODATION

Now that Debbie and I have been here for a little over three months I thought it might be good to share some of our experiences with other club members and start a series of articles for publication in the journal. This is the first part in a series called "TOURING USA" that is intended to introduce members to the USA as a possible destination for those often dreamed about overseas motorcycle trips. The series will examine people, places, accommodation, bikes and bits and all other information relevant to the motorcyclist who wishes to visit the USA. This first part deals with the subject of accommodation with particular emphasis on camping.

The first thing one must realise when riding in the USA is that everyone drives on the wrong side of the road, a little daunting at first, having to learn how to ride all over again, and most of all, remember to KEEP RIGHT. The second thing to remember is that roads and accommodation are generally more crowded than they are in Australia. With this information in mind it is "on your bike" and off into the wide blue yonder. That is, if you can find it through the smog.

The types of accommodation in the USA generally conform to those found in Australia. They vary as much in type as they do in price. Knowing from experience that the average BMW owner does not generally stay in five star hotels, this type will be omitted. There are, however, some differences in accommodation types and standards and I will attempt to highlight these.

By far the cheapest way to see the USA is by camping. A site for a two-man (Editor's note: read two-person) tent can range from \$US6 per night in a National or State park to, wait for it ... \$US25 per night at a privately owned campground close to a major city. Campgrounds vary widely but fall into three main categories:

- (1) State and National park/forest grounds
- (2) private campgrounds
- (3) recreational vehicle (RV) parks.

The recreational vehicle parks generally don't accommodate tents, they are solely devoted to caravans, campervans and the "All American" home-away-from-home known as an RV which is a luxurious huge campervan about the size of a bus. Some of these places even have cable television hook-up available and people get most upset if they can't get their favourite cable network at the park. Besides this, the RV park has all of the "mod cons" necessary for Mum (sorry .. Mom), Dad, 2.31 children (one on crack, the other into gang warfare and the 0.31?) and I family pets, to have a great get-away-from-it-all holiday.

In general, the private campgrounds do accommodate tents as well as caravans, etc. A word of warning here — private campgrounds are generally expensive (by Australian standards) and are poorly kept. The cheapest private campground will set you back about \$U\$10 per night (\$A14) for an unpowered site. The sites are untidy and the amenities are not up to the demand for them. An example of this is a campground that we stayed at over Easter; it had two showers and two toilets in both the men's and the women's block for a total of around 200 people and it cost \$10 for the one night we were there. Another thing to watch with private campgrounds is that the fee may depend on the location of the site within the campground.

The best and cheapest accommodation is to be found in the national and state parks and forests. In general, accommodation is on

a first come first served basis, although the more popular places such as Sequoia (part 3) need to be booked in advance, even for a tent site. The cost is about \$US6 per night which gives you a clean, well kept site with fire place, table, chairs and running water. Combine this with some fabulous scenery and you have the best value for your camping dollar. Shower and toilet facilities vary widely at these parks with most offering pit toilets such as those at Geehi hut and no wash basin, to those offering the full complement of modern bathroom facilities.

Park and forest campgrounds have plenty of room, the ratio of tents to ground area being very low. Each site has its own parking area adjacent to it in which only one vehicle may park. This is great in one respect in that you are not camping on top of the person next to y but can be frustrating when the campground is full, even though there is still plenty of room. This is by far the best way to see the USA, the cost of a site is cheap relative to the average cost, but is still expensive to the Aussie with a flat dollar.

If perhaps you are looking for other types of accommodation there are of course motels that vary in price from \$US18 per night and spiral ever upwards. The other major form of accommodation is cabin style which will set you back around \$US30 per night.

One form of accommodation that is sadly lacking in the USA is the faithful country pub. Saloons and taverns do not offer the accommodation that our pubs offer in OZ and so a cold wet biker has either a motel or his wet tent to crash in for the night.

Anyhow, that's about it for accommodation. The next part will cover a trip we did to Morro Bay, a coastal village about halfway between L.A. and San Francisco.

Dear fellow riders

We have been negotiating for a long time with Territories about rider training without much success. At a recent meeting we decided to bring some election pressure to bear — letter attached for your info. We've had some pretty good press recently so hopefully we'll have a win soon and see the introduction of a government-sponsored scheme in ACT.

At that same meeting we adopted two policies on rider training:

- 1. That ACT should introduce a compulsory, high-standard, prelicence skill test for learner riders.
- 2. That a standard of training be provided to allow riders to pass that test.

These go hand in hand with the need for the training to include 'attitude' factors like defensive riding, etc.

On another topic we have been successful in having two motorcycles—only parking bayscreated near the Edmund Barton Building. If your members work there they can now take advantage of this conveniently located parking.

Dear Mr Scholes (etc)

The Australian Transport Advisory Council some time ago as part of a package of measures for motorcycle safety endorsed the principle that pre-licence, off-road rider training should be introduced throughout Australia.

The Motorcycle Riders Association through its membership of the Australian Motorcycle Council endorsed the need for training to be included in the motorcycle package.

It is encouraging to see that formal training schemes have been progressively introduced. The Federal Office of Road Safety's involvement is also beneficial.

In ACT despite agreement in principle from the Department of Territories we still have made little progress. MRA has been negotiating without tangible success for over 5 years; trained instructors have volunteered their services to no avail.

ACT is lagging behind the rest of Australia. Of all the States and Territories we are the only one not to have introduced some kind of government-sponsored scheme.

Government sponsorship is essential to put it financially in reach of the young learner.

As riders die in increasing numbers on ACT roads the 6,000 motorcyclists of the ACT ask what is your attitude to rider training?

If you are elected in July would you work for the allocation of modest funds to this community cost-saving service?

We look forward to your early response.

The R71 was made from 1938 'til 1941 during which some 2,000 exampleswere built and was the last motorcycle from B.M.W. to be powered by a side valve motor.


The motor, a type 271/l was a flat twin four stroke with a capacity of $745\,\mathrm{cm}^3$ and a bore and stroke of $78\,\mathrm{mm}$ with a compression ratio of 5.5 to 1 and gave out 22 bhp at 4,600 rpm, it was fitted with two Graetzin slid type carburettors. There was a single dry plate cluth which feeds power to a type 25.0/2 four speed gearbox with gear ratio of 3.6 to 1 for 1st, 2.28 to 1 for 2nd, 1.7 to 1 for 3rd and 1.3 to 1 for 4th. A drive shaft with spiral bevel gears flexible hardy and universal joint gave power to the back wheel with a final drive ratio of 3.6 to 1 for solo or 3.8 to 1 for sidecar use.

The frame a type 251/1 was a closed triangle twinloop made out of oval section tubing. Fitted with telescopic forks with hydraulic shock absorber and helical compression springs up front and telescope plunger with helical compression springs at the rear. the wheels were 19 inch with single leading shoe brakes front and rear.

The R71 was 2130mm long, 960mm high, 815mm wide and weigh 187 kg. It had a top speed of 125km/h and a fuel consumption of 22.2km/1 with a 14 litre fuel tank it had

a range of 310km.

The R71 replaced the R12 as the heavy duty tourer and sidecar mount. Although well recived by some the R71 did not have much time to make an impression on the average rider for in 1939 production of motorcycles for the civilian market were phased out, a military version was to continued in production 'til 1941 when it was replaced by the famed R75 military outfits. Although B.M.W. were never to build a side valve motorcycle again copies of the R71 were to show up in other parts of the world, the most notable being the CMR motorcycles from France and the Dnieper outfits from the Minsk motorcycle works in the Soviet Union.


