

You have to assume that every driver is unaware of your presence; it is only your vigilance and caution that will prevent him or her taking you out.

If you haven't been out on your bike for a while, don't forget to check your tyre pressures. Despite all the modern technology, alloy wheels aren't all that good at holding air and you might be surprised at how much your tyre pressure can drop while the bike is sitting in the garage.




Kosciuszko Rally

Product Report—'Motor Mover'

A while ago I started to write an article for Shaft Drive Lines which went something like this - "The tally by Ian Hahn (Shaft Drive Lines April '05) of bikes owned and sometimes operated by club members (271 Beamers and 69 Others ~ 4: 1 ratio) also made the comment that it would be good to see more of the 'Others' out and about".

Maybe many of these 'Others' are inaccessible at the back of the shed or a project in progress. Perhaps they are not seen due to the time and effort to bring them out front to ride or work on. Any hesitancy, head or bum scratching by you is quickly picked up by the ever alert financial controller/domestic bank manager/swmbo who suggests a more urgent priority - mow the grass, paint the house. Desirous of a motorbike project (R80GS) to tinker with I knew it faced the prospect of numerous other projects that are buried at the back of the shed never to see light of day.

Unless tinkertoy was always accessible to work on, the time and effort required for a short burst of work activity may be quickly overtaken by a more urgent priority. It started me thinking;

If only; a trolley to move tinkertoy in and out of storage in the shed

But how; buy one or make one. For \$200+ there is a swish steel motorbike trolley advertised in various bike magazines but if I could make one that's \$200 I could spend on something that I couldn't make.

Oh; I don't have the requisite equipment/skills to cut/bend/weld a metal trolley.

I wonder; could it be in timber, might be a bit rude, crude and how's your father but should work.

Strategy (luv dat talk); needs to be small enough not to trip over but big enough to be stable, low enough for the centre-stand but high enough for any deflection to clear the floor, minimum bulk but strong enough at the critical stress points. So with secondhand wheels (ex broken office chair), timber (ex decking timber- hardwood), bolts (restricted choice, had to buy them) a prototype Heath Robinson model was built sans engineering plans.

Prototype modifications required: widen between rails due to inherent bulk of timber to clear bike stand freely; plastic chair wheels did not roll well (load was above recommended limit) or pivot much better and they would not stay still while pulling bike onto the centrestand (didn't have locking tabs) The lower the trolley platform the easier it is to pull the bike onto the centrestand. A block of wood under the back wheel (20-50mm) also helps heaps. Trawled the usual DIY shops for wheels but settled on grey rubber castors with locking tabs from







Capital Bearing Services Fyshwyck- 'do you need an invoice, no, then that's \$10 each mate' (Google web for Fallshaw Castors - more info than you'll ever need on wheels). So with new wheels and wider trolley it works really well on a smooth concrete floor- I can whizz it out at a moment's notice and can be up to my armpits in oil and bits before a more urgent priority can be pasted on the fridge door "De

List".

Speaking of floors, with light coloured paving paint I did the immediate work area (there's no need to get rash and do the whole garage now) and found that when I drop things (during a senior moment) they are a lot more easy to find even without my glasses. Also since concrete dusting has been eliminated things stay cleaner longer.

It continued on a bit about timber dimensions, wheel diameters etc which in hindsight is a bit boooring and if the editor includes some photos you can work it out for yourself or give me a call.

Funny how things turn out. I was so pleased with the ease of moving tinkertoy around on a trolley, I now own a bought one and made another. My going bike (K1100RS) regularly shares with my son's R80 a small garden shed which is very squeezy and requires shuffling to access either. Needing a slim efficient trolley for the heavier K1100 a Motor Mover from Becker Enterprises was purchased (knew that \$199 + \$14 freight) would come in handy). For the R80, four pieces of 50cm long decking timber were placed side by side drilled transversely at each end, skewered by threaded rod and "prestressed". Four secondhand skateboard wheels were then slipped on the rod. Hey presto, a onedirectional trolley for the purpose of only moving 30cm sidewards it's OK.

Trolley Summary: Tinkertoy's Heath

Robinson model moves in all directions does the job but is heavy and bulky. R80's trolley is slimmer, lighter but is only one-directional and won't carry much more weight. K1100RS's Motor Mover is value for money. Constructed from 8mm tensile steel it's a slim, 300kg capacity neat design easy to move in all directions. I found Win Becker's service very prompt and helpful. Becker enterprises website www.beckerenterprises.com has a video showing a bike uturning inside a shipping container. Give it a call.

So, if your other bike(s) is at the back of the shed perhaps this has given you some ideas which will allow you a wardrobe of bikes.

Although the weather conditions made it more difficult for all concerned, I certainly benefited and will be keeping in mind the lessons, such as:

- Mount in sequence- hand brake, leg over, side stand up, sit, foot brake on, hand brake off, clutch, gear
- Maximise Space, Scan well forward, sides and back, monitor the Surface, i.e. S-S-S
- Use all 4 fingers on the brake lever
- Touch the foot break when using engine braking to activate brake light to warn those behind.
- Emergency brake in sequence- roll back throttle, squeeze hand brake, clutch, foot brake, drop gears - right/left/right/ left
- Enter bends wide, apex past corner, leave right of centre, position wide of next bend
- Keep clear of the centre line on RH turns,
- Stay focussed on riding by continually thinking the actions.
- Avoid riding when fatigued
- Approaching a stop sign sequence- scan, rear view, gear down, brake, rear view, repeat etc, stop in first.
- Hold in first while waiting to go

(And a few others not in the book, eg: arrive on time, kneel and cross yourself if you are not, don't get too warm and cosy at lunch time, take your corrective medicine like a man, and don't give any lip to the instructor - it's your life that is in the balance)



"GS almost fully booked & more on TS location

Here's the latest on the BMW GS Safari - since our last news update we've gone from a steady stream to a torrent of registrations. Numbers now stand at 91 leaving just 9 places not spoken for - probably even less as you read this! It's great news that the inaugural GS Safari has turned out to be so popular and is going to be a full house! We expect to reach our limit of 100 within the next few days. Subject to confirmation of crew and press numbers (expected to be around 15) we are hoping to be able to make an additional 5 spots available to meet the very strong demand.....which means a total group of 120. Any registrations received after the "full" sign goes up will be placed on a waitlist to fill any subsequent cancellations.



We are currently working on the Accommodation Booking Form which we'll start sending out as an email attachment from mid-July (fingers crossed!) in the order in which you booked (those without an email address will receive this by mail). We are also busy matching the around 300 GPS waypoints recorded during our recce trip with the manual road book record to ensure that you'll be staving on track in November. This is always a very interesting exercise as we often have to back-track after meeting insurmountable obstacles like flooded rivers, dead ends, private roads and even people's back gardens! We actually did end up in two of these in May when tracks inexplicably turned into driveways!



Our start point in November has now been confirmed and is a great riverside location not a million miles from Sydney. And it is here where we'll be having the "Welcome" party. We've also confirmed night two in a luxury "mountain-top" wilderness resort on over 4 square kilometres of natural bushland....it really is something special and at a very special price.

TJ's Tyres Touring Competition

The Judge has been **UNDERWHELMED** with entries for this year's TJ's Touring Town Scrabble Competition. Fred Pensko did send in a photo but alas, it didn't have a place name or his bike in it... though we did work out where it was.

There's a monthly prize for the highest scoring photo received - a very easy way to win something... not forgetting the main prize of tyres to the value of \$400 from TJ's.

The rules are simple:

The qualifying photo is still of the entrant, bike and Hal outside TJ's – worth 20 points.

To score points, you have to take a photo of your bike in front of the signboard giving a town's name. Distance signs such as Yass 50km, Gundagai 200 km, Melbourne 650 km don't count, it must be the sign at the entrance to the town.

Points are scored according to the Scrabble letter value of the town's name:

- No points for anywhere in the ACT except the photo at TJ's.
- Single word score for towns in NSW and Victoria.
- Double word score for towns in SA and QLD.
- Triple word score for towns in WA, NT, Tasmania and overseas.

The rest of the rules:

- Photos of suburb names don't score any points so you can't just go to Sydney and take photos of Bondi, Chatswood etc.
- Only one photo per town per entrant– you can't put in multiple photos of the same town.

Scoring examples:

OUEANBEYAN

Scrabble value 10 + 1 + 1 + 1 + 1 + 3 + 1 + 4 + 1 + 1 = 24 points, Single word score

LAUNCESTON

Scrabble value = 1+1+1+1+1+1+1+1+1+1=12, triple word score because it's in Tasmania makes it 36 points.

Getting Trucked

Olaf Moon's gourmet biking weekend away

Foodies of the gourmand type will tell you that the ultimate dinning experience is a degustation dinner.

This is one where there are ten (or so) courses, all small but each offering a veritable cornucopia of tastes designed to tickle your every taste bud. Of course, the ideal degustation also includes half glasses of wine, each chosen to perfectly complement each and every course, starting with French champagne. Frankly, I find it to be the ultimate aphrodisiac. But when the meal is in Melbourne, and three international chefs from Spain, Italy and Australia combine their talents, this is an event not to be missed.

"I've booked us in for a great meal – three international chefs are visiting Melbourne – can you get there on Friday week? This is classic Sheryle, organising the world. "But I wanted to go riding that weekend" was my reply, followed by her quick response – "I'll organise it!"

The dinner was to be worth every minute, every dollar and every pain of getting there. Fresh oysters with champagne to start, but not the ones from Sydney or weedy ones from Bateman's Bay, but the really plump creamy ones from the Dentrecasteaux Channel on Tasmania's south coast. Then seafood morsels, sashimi to start, with Australian wasabi (the world's best), Balmain bug tails in butter, sliced rare wagyu beef, cream leek soup, truffles, Chinese duck, peppermint gelati and a host of other minute offerings, each provided with a

As it happened, I need to be at home one lunch time when they came to collect them. Of course the truck driver is a biker, and readily claimed to be a multiple-miscreant, owning more than one machine. So you can imagine he took special care. Firstly they very carefully look over each bike for damage, to avoid later arguments then load them into a 15 tonne van, using a hydraulic lifting tray. Two weeks later, I fly into
Melbourne and cab it to Sheryle's local
office, which happens to have an Audi
dealership on the ground floor. Of course,
that is where the bikes are sitting, perfectly
safe. A couple of locals have already spied the
ACT registration plates and are fascinated to find
out what we are up to and how the "little Vespa"
came to be in Melbourne. After packing her computer
and papers somewhere, we ride to the hotel, which was
just down the street and dress for dinner. As mentioned,
the latter turns out to be one of the best, and half the
foodies from Melbourne have turned up for the French
truffles and ultra-fresh seafood, plus magnificent wines.

Luckily we have walked from the hotel for dinner, and now we stagger slowly back along the river, hoping uselessly that the little exercise will offset the food and alcohol.

The next day, Saturday, we had decided to ride the short distance to the Yarra Valley and stay at the Sebel Lodge, not so ex-y (especially if booked via the internet) and very quiet. It is set in the countryside to the east of the city. However, the

internet mapping system from which we had printed the directions took us via the back streets of Melbourne, with one wrong turn, that was completely my fault, resulting in an interesting U turn on a busy road and some very discernable semaphore from Sheryle, clearly aimed at the fool on the silver R1150RT.

The rest of the ride took us out and around the winding roads of the nearby hills rather than directly up the express way – great for the ride, difficult for the navigation. T his prompted me to seriously consider the BMW Navigator II but at a retail price of \$2600 is simply too much – one day it will be on special and I will be the first in the door to acquire one – or maybe I should just attach an old GPS to an equally ancient PDA and make maps (there must be an article in that one for someone with some computing knowledge!)

The Sebel is set in the rolling hills of the Yarra Valley, and apart from stylish rooms, offers two other services that we will definitely avail ourselves of. The first is its "Spa" which includes a brilliant massage service of which we avail ourselves. Guys – if you have never had a massage (other than the Fyshwick type) then try an hour of pummelling – it really cleans the system out and puts a hop in your step.

The second is the food of chef, Marc Brown, African American and ex of Axis Restaurant at the National Museum in Canberra. We take it easy, as tomorrow will be a long day.

Sunday dawns fine and cool. This time I have taped a local map onto my petrol tank so as to "lead the way with style and aplomb" – not pretty but very effective. Nowadays, gaffer or PVC tape must be the 8 gauge fencing wire of noughties. The road winds off through the hills, and I choose to take the scenic route, almost to Mt Baw Baw. The corners become more frequent and decidedly interesting, to the point where the local authorities have put up the yellow "slippery" diamond signs – only this time they have a bike on them, not a car. The slip-road back down to

the Maffra and the Princess Highway before Bairnsdale is one lane wide, but perfect hot-mix bitumen snaking its way through a huge eucalypt forest – what a find!

Around Lakes Entrance we paused for a comfort stop and Sheryle asks how many kilometres she can run the Vespa on a full tank – to which I reply airily – 300. A quick calculation tells us that the distance from our start to Orbost is 304 km and you guessed it, she ran out of petrol with the odometer reading 299 kilometres from the last tank full! A quick nip into Orbost on the 1150RT saw me acquire a gold plated, most extravagant five litre fuel drum in Australia (plus petrol) to get us both back to the station and a coffee and chips. How low had we sunk!

At this point I had planned to ride to Bega and stop in a local motel, unbooked, then ride home via the winding Imlay Road the next day. But Sheryle had other ideas, so we headed straight up the Bonang and Monaro Highways to Bombala and Cooma and home, to spend the Monday with our children. Little did they know or care about my sacrifice!

But the ride was perfect. We covered over 700km that day, with the little Vespa and the BMW not missing a beat. The high plains road between Nimmitabel and Cooma is one of my favourites, wide open, sparkling and free so we will return another day soon, to wrestle with the Imlay or wander the deep south – Victoria's Gippsland or maybe a quick fang to Phillip Island – what do you say to that eh?

Printing of the 'Snowy Region Motorcycle Booklet'. No funds were available at this time. Costings were presented but were outside any funds available at the time.

Suggestions to raise funds were presented.

Motorcycle manufactures, dealers and clubs be approached to sponsor the booklet with the appropriate recognition.

Review of signage on the Alpine Way.

A review has been conducted but the report is not yet available. It concerns the inconsistencies of speed signs and the upgrade of speed advisory signs.
