

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

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Report: World's End Rally

Fred Pensko recently went to the World's End Rally in S.A....and it seems he took a camera...but did he remember to take photos for TJ's competition?

The 30th anniversary of the first World's End Rally held in 1975; that sounded familiar. So I looked through some of the

old memorabilia and sure enough here was the old badge from the 1976 rally.

The memory banks began to open. I recall taking one of my daughters to the second ever World's End Rally when she was only 8 years old. That year I managed a loan of a 650 Yamaha. To save on space the decision was not to take a tent "we'll just take the fly, it never rains in the Flinders Ranges". Ha ha. Well I recall the rain began around about Wagga.

From then on almost every town we came to the first thing was to find a Laundromat to dry gloves etc. It was fine when we finally arrived in Quorn. A few purchases and then it was out to the rally site. During that night the heavens opened again and to this day I'll swear that we did not make camp in a creek bed, but the next

morning we had a 100mm high water mark in our helmets. That seemed to satisfy the gods and we had an uneventful trip through Adelaide and home. That was in '76 was she a little trooper.

Armed with these pleasant memories and not having ridden the bike for some months, what the heck this was too good an opportunity to miss. Thought I'd just have a short first day and visit with friends in Leeton, good choice because the rain absolutely hissst down something fierce and enough wind to blow tails off dogs. I thought this would be great all the way to

the Flinders Ranges. Not so, the next morning sunshine of the highest order and so it was to be for the rest of the trip.

On arrival I could see that almost nothing had changed over the last 29 years. Sure age had crept up on some of us, but a Moto Guzzi could still only get to within the last kilometre before expiring with throttle cable problems, thank goodness I was riding the GS. The stories were as good and tall as I remembered them, the evening camp fire still had the highest flames, the Flinders Ranges were as magnificent as ever and the World's End Rally will continue to be a great rally. It was held on a rather steepish side of the gorge and it was difficult to get a good photograph of the whole camp. It was a good turn out with some 200 bikes making the journey

Because of the early start we managed to beat the crowd and so made the best of the prime kerbside parking spots outside the café, which made for an impressive line-up of bikes.


However ... bet the regulars were hoping that we weren't planning to make it a routine Sunday morning destination.





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A nice little package from work persuaded me to leave and become a grey nomad. Well almost.

After purchasing a new BMW K 1200 LT in August 2004 it has taken me a whole year to make my dream come true. I have seen most of the east coast up to Port Douglas and from the southern tip of Western Australia to Denham, Monkey Mia. This is a silly statement but there are two ways to go, clockwise or anticlockwise. I had not made up my mind when I left Canberra to which way I should go. If I decided to go anticlockwise it would be up to Queensland by the inland route on to Mount Isa, Three Ways (Tennant Creek) and Darwin and come home the long way via Perth.

Most people go in a anti clockwise direction so I considered the option to go in a clockwise direction just to be different. That would be something like Wagga Wagga, Hay, Port Augusta, Perth and then all points North returning via Mount Isa and Bourke.

Still kitted out in winter gear I left Canberra on a cloudy and cool morning fuelled up at Curtin (123.5 c/l) and headed to Yass, but by the time I reached Yass it was obvious a right hand turn was needed to get north as soon as possible. So it was Cowra and all points north. Second fuel stop was Wellington (129.0 c/l). I have been to Bourke several times so

while I cruised at legal speeds I did not stop to see anything except to take some photos. Nyngan was the first night stop (578 km). Something about settling in the bum. Second day is the worse on the bum but it gets better as time goes on. Next night was to be Charleville. I can't help thinking of how the townships in this area look so wrong.

Refilled at Nyngan (130.9 c/l). The day was fine but cold again and I was looking forward to getting further north to warmer weather. Went to Barringun and filled up (119.0 c/l) and had a bite to eat. Could only find standard so I put in 5 litres which should get me to Cunnamulla. So I sat back, set the cruise control and watched the world go by. As the day

progressed I noticed that the road kill was increasing so I turned on my extra sense and used the scanning of moving objects against a still background. While this takes some of the enjoyment from the trip it is necessary to survive. The road kill increased to an unbelievable level until I reached the Northern Territory where it continued but on a lesser scale. Maybe the wildlife in the Territory are smarter than those in Queensland. Filled up at Cunnamulla (129.9 c/l) and continued on to Charleville where I stayed the night (662 kM).

Today it was to get to Longreach so I headed off keeping a sharp eye out for live stock, lots of unfenced roads out

here, and other wild life. The day again was fine and dry, cool in the morning but nice and warm during the day. Time for a detour. I always was going to take detours if the road suited the bike, so I decided that a left turn at Blackall was a good idea. The map showed a sealed road to Isisford. So after lunch and I filled up the bike again (128.0 c/l) it was off to Isisford. The road was sealed all the way but was only single lane so I hoped that I would not meet any road trains on the way. The road was good but the cattle grids

was good but the cattle grids were bad. Broke the right plastic hinge on the vanity mirror in the top case. Too much heavy stuff in the compartment. Must replace it with a metal one as I have done on the left side. Isisford was a small town on the banks of the Barcoo river with the local caravan park just over the bridge on the river bank. It was full with the Grey Nomads with their vans parked so close together there was not enough room to pitch the proverbial tent. Must be good fishing in the river.

On I went to Longreach where I was going to stay for at least a day (549 km). The next day I went to the Qantas museum where the history of our famous airline was displayed. There were lots of exhibits and audio/visual units showing and telling how the airline was formed and its



progress through the years to today. There were lots of documents, clothing, photos and Qantas aircraft of the past. The one thing that stood out as far as I was concerned was a section on the flying boats around the 1950's. I remember my dad taking me to Rose Bay in Sydney to see the flying boats take off and land. We all remember the film "The Aviator" and the Spruce Goose flying boats were going to be the way of the future. Well it did not happen and the last flight from Sydney to Lord Howe Island in a Sunderland (?) flying boat was in the mid 1950's. Other exhibitions were the old office and workshop with other motors and aircraft used by Qantas. The last part of my tour was of an original 747B which we are told is still in flying condition and if required it could be flown out of Longreach in a few days. Personally I think it is there for good. If it stays they are going to build a cover for it to protect it from the sun. This tour I found interesting in many ways but the most interesting was how they determine the life of an aircraft. It is calculated on the number of pressurisations of the aircraft. Qantas uses a figure of 19,000. Once this figure is reached the plane is retired.



Another visit I took was to the old powerhouse which is now a museum. This was very interesting because of my background in the industry. As I travelled further I recognised the familiar type buildings in all the towns. In a lot of towns in Western Australia they are still using these powerhouses for their electricity. It is hard to believe that a lot of these towns only changed over to the grid system in the 1970's

I would hate to think the cost of electricity then as all the diesel had to be trucked in and today with the cost of diesel the electricity bill must be enormous. They also had many other exhibits of old network equipment and household appliances. The generating plant were usually of a 8 or 12 cylinder in line water cooled diesel but one of the units at Longreach was a horizontally opposed unit. (Shades of a Large BMW). It was a 6 cylinder water cooled and ran on either diesel or gas.

Next stop Mount Isa. Left Longreach 0800 and it was still very cold of a morning. Still had on the winter gear. Filled up at Winton (122.9 c/l) and on to Cloncurry for a late lunch. Filled up again (130.9 c/l). Camooweal filled up (139.0 c/l). Arrived Mount Isa (647 km). Booked in, showered and went for a ride around the surrounds and then dinner. This is the place where I dropped the bike for the first time. In the car park of the local club I turned into a row the wrong way with a car coming toward me, saw a vacant spot on my left went to turn in quickly at 1kph and over we went. Big cheer from the club patrons in the outside dining room. No help so I picked it up myself.

First job the next day was to look for a new front tyre. The only place in town with any road tyres was the Honda dealer. They had only two front tyres and one looked like Noah used it on the Ark and the other I thought it was not suitable for the LT. Of course the majority of tyres in stock were the off road type. If you are travelling think about where you may need tyres and check if available and if they have a tyre changing machine. I hope that this front tyre will get me to Darwin (another 1700 km) where there should be a good selection. Spent the rest of the day touring around looking at the mine and other local attractions.

Left Mount Isa for Tennant Creek. Very cold again in the morning. Around 50 km out of town I came across a road train accident. What a mess. Prime mover with four cattle trailers on its side. Cattle roaming all over the place and a lot just lying down not moving. I stopped and took some photos. It looked like a strong wind had just pushed the whole unit on its side. Everything was almost in a perfect straight line with all the trailers still attached to the prime mover. It looked to me like the driver had gone to sleep and put the nearside wheels of the prime mover off the tar seal and into the soft verge. Everything just followed and fell





over. Very handy to do an inspection of the underneath of the unit. Looking at the accident you most likely would have to disconnect all the trailers pull each up right and then the prime mover, check the oil and water reconnect the trailers and drive off.

Tennant Creek (657 km). Booked in to the motel and walked around to the local club and had dinner. All you can eat for \$16.00. Only had one serving but over did it again. This place had the same feeling as some of the other towns had. Took some good photos from the look out next to the motel.

Filled up Tennant Creek (139.9 c/l) and left for Katherine. Not much to see so I sat back engaged the cruise control and watched the world go by. Passed through Renner Springs, Elliott, Newcastle Waters, Dunmarra (standard only available 139.9 c/l) Daly Waters, Larrimah, (144.5 c/l) Mataranka and then Katherine. I found it difficult to find a room so I ended up at a place out of town on the river. Do not think I will go back to that motel again.

At this point I must pass on an observation about accommodation. With the advent of contract labour becoming the done thing with governments, local councils and large firms, rooms in hotels and motels are becoming hostels for workers who stay in one place for a period of time, from several days to weeks, and then move on to the next town or job. They work long hours, sun up to sunset and most likely go to the pub for a beer and dinner after work. This means late night showers, discussions of the next day's work and mobile phone calls etc. with early morning departures around 0600 hrs. and usually driving diesel powered vehicles. I liked to finish my riding at 1600 hrs get cleaned up, go

for a walk around town and then to the pub have a beer and get some dinner, in bed by around 2200 hrs, get up around 0700 hrs and be on the road at 0800 hrs.

So with this problem of accommodation in mind I went to the local tourist bureau and tried to book ahead. I succeeded to book Darwin and Jabiru. Expensive. This time of the year is peak tourist time and with school holidays in the south coming up I found it best to try to book ahead. If you can stand the heat and humidity the best time is summer time.

Next stop was Darwin where I was going to spend a few days, get a new front tyre and an oil and filter change. I went back to pick up the bike and pay the bill (\$168.00) for a filter and oil change and walked outside to get the bike and found it parked on the side stand facing downhill in neutral with the side stand in a section of new tar seal and slowly sinking in to it. I reckon I got there just in time. Not impressed and I let them know.

Next month Ian covers the next part of his trip from Darwin to Western Australia.



This motorcycle was made by the company BFW the forerunner to BMW. (Bayerische Flugzeugwerke).

This engine was based on a design of the English 'Douglas' and was offered to various motorcycle manufactures to fit into their frames. The best known was the 'Victoria'.

The cooling fins ran downward from the valve gear to the crankcase. This engine was also used for stationary purposes and was fitted with a cooling fan. It also found a home in a light aircraft designed by Ing F. Budig. BMW designed and built its own carburettor, which was mounted more toward the front cylinder. The castings were made by BMW and showed a high quality of finish with the BMW logo cast in

Power was transmitted to the rear wheel via a 3 speed gearbox and chain. Braking was by a wooden block rubbing on a rim fitted to the rear wheel.
